## **TESTING CHOICES AND RESOURCES**

If your intentions are evaluation, diagnosis, and prescription for learning; preparation for future testing; providing data for admissions; or scholarship applications and resources for researchers, there are resources available to home schoolers apart from the public schools. Keep records! Chart progress!

Teaching students to evaluate (judge) themselves is an important skill for every area of life (and will be very helpful in college!).

**Individualized parent-designed evaluation**: Written or oral, you can design quizzes, practice tests, chapter tests, mid-terms and finals, etc.

**Standardized curriculum-driven evaluations**: Questions at the end of chapters and discussion questions are only two methods provided by many curriculum publishers. Many provide mastery tests to pass before progressing to the next level.

**Presentations** (book reports, speeches, and science experiments are examples) can provide the evidence of learning achievement, and teach communication skills as well. To enlarge the audience, consider your support group, extended family, neighbors, etc.
